
MONTHLY MEETING

SAFETY MINUTE

STUDENT ARTICLE - SAFETY WHEN WORKING WITH NUCLEAR MATERIAL

As a newly introduced engineering student, I have gained a wider understanding of the importance of safety. Before my studies, I was aware of safety protocol, PPE, emergency response, and all the other subcategories of safety; however, I did not realize their great importance within engineering. Every process, every plan, and every idea require some form of safety to be present in order to operate. Studying Industrial and Systems engineering has broadened my once narrow vision pertaining to health and safety. Importantly, organizations like ASSP offer a better understanding to those who have not widely experienced Environmental Health and Safety; additionally, ASSP is able to create a community of people who wish to be submerged in the safety world.



Looking into internships and researching companies, I came across BWX Technologies Inc. BWXT's mission is to, "provide safe and effective nuclear solutions for global security, clean energy, environmental restoration, nuclear medicine and space exploration" ("BWXT Tech..."). Along with the corporate purpose stating, "We employ nuclear technology to solve some of the world's most important problems" ("BWXT Tech..."). As one can imagine, dealing with nuclear material is a significant task where there cannot be room for error. However, errors may occur and that is why EHS (Environmental Health & Safety) is immensely important.



BWXT emphasizes safety on their website, "Managing complex programs, projects and facilities for the government requires managers and teams that clearly understand safety and security. BWXT securely manages and operates facilities that, combined, cover thousands of acres and millions of square feet. BWXT is committed to maintaining a highly skilled security force to constantly monitor our sites" ("BWXT Tech..."). BWXT does a great deal with naval nuclear propulsion, consisting of the "manufacturing of nuclear reactor components for U.S. Naval submarines and aircraft carriers and other nuclear and non-nuclear research" ("BWXT Tech..."). Oh, how this spiked my interest! When I found BWXT's stress on safety, I was pleasantly surprised seeing how deeply they care for their employees.

Delving deeper into safety concerning nuclear endeavors, I came across Harvard's Environmental Health and Safety website. This article provided clear and concise boundaries for those interested in learning about safe radiation practices. Two main points were made; the first being, "Minimize your exposure and ensure the safety of everyone that enters your work area when working with radioactive materials" ("Safe Radiation..."). Here it can be understood that when working with radioactive materials, you must account for not only yourself, but those around you. Therefore, one must always think about others and how an "accident" could deeply affect those around you. The second point being to, "Use our guidance to prepare your work area, perform contamination surveys, shielding, using personal protective equipment (PPE), and learn about common radionuclides" ("Safe Radiation..."). Understanding the consequences of the actions you are performing motivates individuals to be extra careful. This understanding will help you to focus on safety precautions, think about others, and think about the harm nuclear activity can cause.

A world without safety would be absolute chaos! This is why it will be my duty in the near future, as an Industrial and Systems engineer, to ensure and optimize safety precautions in any given workplace.
